Re: 2020 Third Quarter Exemptions and Violations Summary

MESSAGE:

Exemptions

On July 28, 2020, and exemption was granted for an application of Habitat.

Reason for Need: Since 2003, Friends of Corte Madera Creek Watershed has received funding from the California State Coastal Conservancy's Invasive Spartina Project (ISP) to work toward eliminating three species of invasive, non-native cordgrasses (*Spartina* spp.) and their hybrids found in this estuary. These destructive plants alter both the structure and function of tidal mudflats, creeks and marshes, harming native bird, mammal, and fish species. Invasive cordgrasses also clog open channels, increasing flood risk.

Options/Alternatives: The ISP has researched and developed an eradication strategy that uses non-chemical treatment whenever possible. However, because two of the invasive cordgrasses and the hybrids spread by both seeds and underground rhizomes, and digging can spread these plants further, some herbicide was used. Early treatment at Creekside marsh included digging, moving, and herbicide. Because of this careful work, in 2019 the project was able to use just 9 ounces of imazapyr to treat the remaining plants that spread by rhizomes, and 99% of these invasive plants have been removed from the marsh. A small amount of herbicide is being used in the summer of 2020 in order to ensure that the remaining 1% of these plants are unable to re-infest this area. See the map for areas that will be treated. The ISP has carefully documented the project, including the staff's thorough analysis of the various treatment methods; the documentation is available on ISP's website at www.spartina.org.

Plan to Preclude Future Use: Eliminating this population will prevent the infestation from growing and requiring more intense treatments.

On July 1, 2020, an exemption was issued for PT Waspfreeze II.

Reason why Restricted: This product may be applied to a park, playground, or picnic area.

Reason for Need: Active wasp nests

Options/Alternatives: Traps have been placed and monitored

Plan to Preclude Future Use: Continue to monitor and trap insects and queen wasps at appropriate time of the year

Time Period Needed: The exemption request is for the rest of 2020.

Violations:

There were **no violations** of Marin County IPM Policy in the third quarter of 2020.
